Dear Juvenile Justice Service Providers:


We are pleased to present you with 2006 service and outcome information for the Division. This year we are issuing a brief snap-shot of our work with youth during 2006. Our goal is to continue to compile and share information with counties and other juvenile justice professionals about the state's most seriously delinquent youth who are sent to juvenile corrections.

During 2006, the Division continued to focus on improvements for programming and re-entry of youth to the community. Several hundred re-entry tool kits were distributed to counties and residential placement facilities. The goal was to acquaint them with the Division's re-entry model and to assist them in fulfilling their vital role in the re-entry process for youth leaving juvenile correctional institutions.

In the fall of 2006, county and Division staff were trained on an instrument to assess youth who have committed sex offenses. Sue Righthand, Ph.D., one of the co-authors of the Juvenile Sex Offender Assessment Protocol (J-SOAP II) trained 125 staff on how to use the instrument to guide case decisions about effective treatment and supervision of youth who have sexually abused others.

Outcome information on education, cognitive intervention, recidivism and youth accountability efforts is included in this report. The Division remains committed to implementing research-based programs designed to reach seriously delinquent youth. Effective programs are the means by which we can impact youth and families, and achieve our mission of building skills in youth and protecting the public. 


JCI Population on June 30, 2006*




Recidivism

The Division continues to track on recidivism data on youth released from the Juvenile Correctional Institutions. Within two years of release, 16.40% of youth released in 2004 committed a crime which resulted in a return to a juvenile institution or incarceration in a Wisconsin prison.


